Each participation is an opportunity to showcase the richness of Bulgarian folklore to the Australian audience and to keep our cultural identity alive and accessible to new friends and partners.

"Once upon a time..." - legends in the making

Georgi Georgiev and the fastest bicycle on the planet

On March 6, 1942, in Varna, a boy was born whose hands would go on to create the fastest bicycle in the world. His name is Georgi Georgiev, and years later, the world would call him a genius and an innovator. Georgi graduated in sculpture from the Academy of Arts in Belgrade, and despite not knowing computer programs, geometric formulas, or aerodynamic analyses, his bicycles from the "Varna" series became a symbol of perfection. His creation, the "Varna Tempest," became the fastest human-powered vehicle, reaching the incredible speed of 133.28 km/h. For the first time, a human-powered engine reached 1/10 the speed of sound.

Georgi emigrated to Canada in 1971 and settled on Gabriola Island, where, in his small workshop in the garage, he began building these futuristic bicycles. Every part, every weld, and every joint was handcrafted by him. His bicycles, named "Varna" as a symbol of his attachment to his hometown, amazed specialists with their incredible aerodynamics. With them, Canadian Sam Whittingham broke the human speed record a total of nine times, and French racer Barbara Buatois became the fastest woman on the planet, reaching 121 km/h.

Georgi's vehicle underwent complex computer analysis in an aerodynamic tunnel at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver. They were unanimous: "Varna" is the most perfect aerodynamic shape ever created by humankind.





In 2001, the British invested over a million dollars to defeat "Varna" and return from Nevada with a new world record. Worldrenowned scientists and laboratories took part in the creation of their vehicle, equipped with industrial-power computer processors and complex programs for graphic and aerodynamic analysis. This led to the creation of the ultramodern bike, named "Blueyonder," which was entrusted to Sydney Olympic champion Jason Queally to secure victory in Nevada. The result? It reached only 103 km/h.

Georgiev does not keep the designs of his models a secret. He shares them openly, and many of his competitors fully copy the "Varna." According to him, talent should be used to make the world a better place, and everyone has their mission on this planet. His motto is: "If everyone on this planet decides one day to do what they are best at, the whole world will change for the better." He declines sponsorships and does not differentiate himself from his competitors - he creates his innovations with the desire and confidence that they will benefit everyone.

Today, Georgi Georgiev remains a legend in the world of speed bicycles. His creations stand not only as technical marvels but also as a symbol of human ability to express oneself and pursue innovation with unwavering determination.

November: the harbinger of holidays, traditions, and warmth before the year's end

As November arrives, we enter the final weeks of the year. The events of the past months have shown the strength and connection within our community, and the upcoming holidays provide us with yet another reason to come together and celebrate Bulgarian customs and culture. The celebration of the Day of the Bulgarian Revival Leaders is just the beginning of a series of exciting events that will fill our days with joy and shared moments until the end of the year. Coming up soon is also the annual Christmas picnic, organized especially for the little ones.

On November 11, we honor St. Mina the Great Martyr – protector of families and travelers, guardian of orphans and the homeless. According to folklore, St. Mina also protects against wolves, which is why his day marks the beginning of the "Wolf Days." In some parts of Bulgaria, these days last until November 21 and bring with them ancient customs and prohibitions – women cover the floor around the hearth with clay to "seal" the mouths of the beasts, and red threads are tied around knives and scissors to keep wolves away from the home. There is also a strict ban on working with wool to prevent threats to the sheep and flocks.

On November 15, the Christmas Fast begins – a time for spiritual cleansing and preparation for the upcoming holidays. Fasting is a tradition that reminds us of humility and unity as we await the joy of Christmas. Whether we fast or not, this time brings us closer to our roots and prepares us for the warmth and comfort of the festive season.

As Christmas and New Year draw near, holiday lights will soon brighten our homes, and we will gather with loved ones to celebrate not only the end of the year but also the new beginning that awaits us. We wish you a meaningful and joyful completion of these last weeks of the year.
